Mr. FARR of California. Mr. Speaker, today across the country, thousands of students on our



college campuses are silent. They are silent as a sign of solidarity of persons who, because of their sexual orientation and gender identification, cannot speak for themselves. They are silent as a form of protest against a society that silences persons who are different, persons

They are silent, but we in Congress should not be. We should shout and raise our voices and call for an end to discrimination and prejudice against gays, lesbians, bisexuals and transgender persons. We should affirm loudly that by this day of silence, America has the capacity and the heart to say to all persons are just that, persons; and all persons are deserving of fair treatment. # The Lady Boys of Thailand

hey sit comfortably at the tables of one of the outdoor bars in the middle of the Night Bazaar of Chiang Mai, an old walled city surrounded by a murky moat in the north of Thailand. The Rainbow flag flies high and business is brisk. The lady boys are adept at entertaining the Western men, most of whom are older and not so very handsome anymore, but no one seems to notice or care all that much.

Although Western men come by the

ing him that in the States, you're done with at 25, so he should consider himself lucky as he has another ten years to enjoy in Scotland than we in America.

Their names are usually too long even for one another, so everyone has a nickname. Nui was the young man serving behind the bar, not exactly a lady boy himself, but quite effeminate with his lithe body, sweet smile and attentive manners. I was with a Londoner, Peter, although he looked more Mediterranean

planeloads to Thailand for sex, whether with the women or the Thai guys, many of the hotels will not allow the lady boys in the rooms with their Sugar Daddies, so other arrangements must be made. There is always the House of Male, the beautiful teakwood bathhouse located on a tiny Soi, or alleyway, outside the city walls, across from the International Insect Museum. Bring your own condoms, though, as the house doesn't supply them as in the bathhouses of the West. The men who are really serious about getting laid in Thailand rent out apartments by the week or month where the desk clerks aren't so nosey about who comes and goes. Others are more willing to risk the wrath of the hotel clerk and the expected knock on the

Since the days of the Viet Nam war, Thailand has been a place where Western men come to fulfill sexual fantasies that cannot be fulfilled at home. Unfortunately, except for a few randy young Aussies from down under, most of the men are past their prime, paunchy and even sort of sad looking. You see them walking around town with their young tarts by their sides, and sweet as it may be, it is, nonetheless, a sad statement on our own Western obsession with age and physical appearances. Over the last thirty years or so in the West, we have created a cult to the perfect physique that reminds one of the glory days of ancient Sparta and Athens where muscle-bound athletes would perform in the nude for the sensual pleasures of the lusting masses. We are so hung up on youth and beauty, on pecs and penile size that people have become as disposable as a paper cup. A Scottish man told me that a gay man in Scotland is finished at 35 years old. I responded by tell-

than British. And he was more my type than the slender Thai boys. But now and again, Nui would smile at me and urge me to go chat up the lady boys at the bar. A couple of them came over to say hello, offer their company and look lovingly in my eyes, as though promising every pleasure conceivable, and then some. Nui assured me that I could have any one of them there for a just few hundred Bhats, or under ten dollars. Personally, I much prefer the Western look than the Asian and while I was happy talking with this tall English stud next to me, I sensed that he was entertaining thoughts of taking one of the lady boys back to his hotel and risking the inevitable knock on the door.

No one seems to really notice the lady boys. No one except the Westerners, that is. We try so hard to blend in with the mainstream that seeing these lady boys in the streets is quite remarkable.

Apparently, many of them come from the Northeast of Thailand where the poverty is overwhelming and opportunities rare, so they migrate to cities like Bangkok and Chiang Mai to work in the sex trade. Some want only to make enough money to settle into a better situation, while others want to be cared for. They form close emotional bonds with their men, oftentimes believing they have found the man of their dreams, who, invariably, is from some country in the West. For example, one young man I met at the bar told me he had a boyfriend in Amsterdam he loved very much and that one day he was going to Amsterdam to live with him. I surely didn't want to break his bubble, but were I him, I wouldn't bank on the fidelity of a gay Westerner, especially one from Amsterdam, that's for sure.


Surely, it is much less common these days for a trans-identified person to actually be refused such help solely on this

# **Proof Through The Night That Pak and Zhang Pack Punch Our Sign Was Still There**

\$5 million potential budget crunch has crushed Santa Cruz .City Council's plans to dump the controversial River Street Sign-at least for a year. That was the Council's decision at its April 9 meeting, led by council member Emily Reilly, who observed that too much time had been spent on the issue already.

Alert observers may remember that from its first appearance last autumn, the optimistic, upbeat, early-'60's-style metallic mini-monstrosity had raised a furor, its brushed metal and primary colors raising the hackles of unapologetic ruralists and self-styled art critics alike.

Calls for the gargantuan Sign to be repainted, covered over, or replaced entirely with some more symbolically native material-redwood, driftwood, or perhaps hemp-multiplied. Crane companies came forward to offer free removal. And Council member Ed Porter listed the despised item for sale on eBay, describing it in glowing terms. Twice. No big bites.

The failed sale, the budget crunch, and the countervailing influence of a loose group of modernists and public finance followers who lobbied to save the Sign finally drove the debate to a well deserved death, and it will remain in rigor mortis for the foreseeable future.

# **County Continues Secret Snitch**

Ever wanted to talk directly to whomever's calling county officials about your household's peculiarities, and find out what the problem really is?

Well, no such luck.

Against the advice of its own planning director, and contrary to the wishes of a frustrated crowd, the County Board of Supervisors voted at its March 12 meeting to continue using anonymous whistle blowers as a secret civilian code enforcement staff.

So what's the problem? For one thing, the volume of complaints has so dramatically that it's overwhelmed county code enforcement personnel. This has left significant health threats unaddressed while minor matters earn red tags. So concluded the county Grand Jury, who looked into the system last year and found it badly broken.

For another, community-wide wars keep breaking out wherever anonymous complaints dominate. In Topanga Canyon, one hyperactive anonymous complainant set off a cycle of retaliatory reporting which now engulfs entire neighborhoods in revenge. Many of these begin when a new wealthy homeowner moves in and decides that the older poorer residents are really not quite up to snuff.

Too, local planning officials have become fatigued with playing the role of accessories to harassment. One case in point: an award-winning community broadcast facility has faced twenty years of false complaints-including charges that it was conducting gambling operations-by faceless cowards hiding behind the superior power given them by county law.

So County Planning Director Alvin James asked supervisors to cut the burgeoning problem down to size by requiring mediation between neighbors over minor complaints—a process that would reveal names.

Uh-uh, said the Supes. In the end, only supervisor Jeff Almquist supported the mediation move, saying that it would be healthy for neighbors to start talking directly again. All the rest-Pirie, Beautz, Campos and Wormhoudt-voted to keep the civilian spy system in place.

#### **Election Out takes**

While anti-tax crusaders crow over the success of Measure L, the county utilitytax repeal, some aren't so sure that the vote was as much anti-tax as anti-county. "The same voters raised their own taxes by voting for the school bonds," observes one political onlooker. "How anti-tax can they be?" ... Which may be hopeful news for the city of Santa Cruz, where a similar utility-tax repeal has just qualified for the November ballot. In one of the odder primary election shenanigans, an ex-mayor of Santa Cruz was spotted tying 'Caution' ribbons around one supervisorial candidate's signs, and confronted personally, though no action was taken ..

#### Supervisors: Let the Japanese Out!

In a particularly intriguing agenda item, the County Board of Supervisors voted at its February 26 meeting to let the Japanese Americans interned in WWII camps out for some air.

The Board, some 59 years after the fact, rescinded "the action taken by the Board of Supervisors in 1943 which resulted in the adoption of a resolution protesting the release of Japanese and Japanese Americans from relocation camps, and approved related action." The "related action" is not described.

An admirable move, we think, to reverse racist policies, no matter how much later in time. Which leads us to hope for a Board apology for its parallel current policies, which have zoned nearly all the county's unbuilt land solely for the wealthiest few and thus excluded virtually everyone of color, sometime around the year 2061.

**CLASSICAL REVIEW**

Te ran into John Larry Granger a few weeks ago at Blue in the Castro. He was on his way to guest conduct the New Haven Symphony, excited that he was about to become a bicoastal conductor. For Program 5 of the Santa Cruz County Symphony, Jung-Ho Pak of the New Haven and San Diego Symphonies took on conducting duties, giving Granger the opportunity to observe

Suite for Orchestra, Op.35, since MTT conducted it the day he was appointed Music Director of the San Francisco Symphony, and we were not disappointed. The orchestra played with a rather astonishing authority, providing the big sound required of Rimsky-Korsakov's brilliant orchestration. Concertmaster Kristina Anderson has never been more graceful than in the sweet, plaintive playing of the solo violin passages which signify Sheherazade telling her tales. KUSP

the orchestra from the audience. In addition to giving conductors a chance to study their own orchestras from a different perspective, guest conducting gives conductors the opportunity to work with different musicians, perform for new audiences, and add another orchestra to their resume. For the audience, it's a treat to experience another personality at the podium.

Jung-Ho Pak is a graceful, athletic conductor, a figure constantly in motion. The orchestra responded with a balletic performance of music of Glinka, Glazunov and Rimsky-Korsakov. Mikhail Glinka's (1804 - 1857) sparkling Russlan and Ludmilla Overture, based on Pushkin's fairy tale poem, was crisply performed, with excellent playing from the entire orchestra. This was followed by the Violin Concerto in A Minor, Op. 82, of Alexander Glazunov (1865-1936). The soloist, Howard Zhang, the winner of the 2001 Klien String Competition, is a student of the late Dorothy Delay and Itzhak Perlman at Julliard. This tall, lanky, boneless 17-year-old, swimming in an oversized tux (we understand that at rehearsal, his jeans were big enough for three of him), effortlessly played this impressionistic work, negotiating intricate passage work with ease and giving legato phrases an exquisitely sweet, warm sound. The orchestra made the most of this luscious, lovely, rather wispy music. Zhang, treated to a standing ovation, seems nonchalant about his effect on an audience. After politely brief bows, he ambled off, leaving a well wisher in hot pursuit with a bouquet of flowers. We're told he's mad for cars, as is many a teenager of driving age.

We hadn't heard the final work of the program, Nicholay Rimsky-Korsakov's (1844 - 1908) Sheherazade, Symphonic

88.9FM already broadcast the April 6 performance on April 14. The next performance of the Santa Cruz County Symphony takes place at the Civic on May 4, with a program of Bach's Chaconne from Partita No.2 for Violin, Beethoven's Piano Concerto No.4, and Stravinsky's Firebird Suite.

The San Francisco Ballet continues to please with programs fairly bursting with variety. Mark Morris' choreography, set to music of Richard Strauss after Francois Couperin makes fascinating blend of preclassical and modern ballet movements. Morris has an uncanny ability to respond to music both physically and spiritually, with a sophisticated, playful response to the rhythms of a work. When a dancer or the ensemble makes a pointed reference to, say a passage's ending note, it becomes a witty remark. Contemporary in spirit, partnering between men and women is mutually supportive, non sexual, and relaxed. Helgi Tomasson's Chi-Lin, performed to the music of Bright Sheng (who also conducted the work), showcased the exceptional talent of Yuan Yuan Tan as the mythical Chinese creature representing peace, justice, truth, and wisdom. Colorfully costumed and staged, the work is classical in concept, relying on the technique of the dancers rather than inventiveness of choreography. Black Cake, danced improbably to the music of Stravinsky, Massenet, Mascagni, Janacek and Tchaikovsky, is in turns sexy and hilarious. To experience the women of the company dancing authoritatively in swingy, metallic gray cocktail dresses and black dance heels and the men in sheer black tights has got to take a number of people's breaths away, for a variety of reasons.

# Role Model for America— Lynn Breedlove

# A review of her first novel, Godspeed

ver seven years in the making, Lynn Breedlove's debut novel, Godspeed, is not for the lighthearted or mainstream-which is precisely why it is such an important read. Released by the prestigious St. Martin's Press, Breedlove has captured the life of a working class, punk, dyke-boy perfectly. Breedlove is famous, in the queer world, as the lead singer of the all-dyke (and first, I'd argue) punk San Francisco, band, Tribe 8. She has toured extensively internationally, and has lent her talents to performance arts troupes like Sister Spit and Tribe Spit Deep for numerous national tours. This book seems to capture the tormented mindset of an artist in what is definitely the best iconography of a punk dyke lifestyle ever. Godspeed is to my generation what Beebo Brinker and Stone Butch Blues was for past generations—the capturing of history by telling our stories ourselves.

Godspeed is the story of Jim, a working class San Francisco boy-dyke / speed freak / bike messenger who works very rarely and lives in a squat in Bernal Heights. Her quest in life is to get clean and find love. At the beginning of the

When thinking of one of his girls being molested by her father Jim thinks: "She was off playing in her magic forest where five-year-olds go when life gets stupid."

Godspeed is a rare novel because it was

novel, Jim's life is little more than finding drugs, shooting drugs, chasing a girl who wants him to quit the drugs, and scheming money and friends for more drugs. So many drugs, that many readers will be put off by Jim's story, as Breedlove's descriptive writing is so good that you can't help but feel like you are a junkie too. Jim's two challenges in life are drugs and Ally, a hard-working, stripper, rockerchick who isn't ready for Jim's love. Both the drugs and the loss of Ally influence his decision to leave it all and become a roadie for the all-dyke band Hostile Mucous. Hostile Mucous share a lot of similarities with Breedlove's band Tribe 8 in that the lead singer likes to wear a dick, gets folks to suck it, and then cuts it off as part of the floor show. Touring with the band gives Jim a chance to quit shooting drugs and leads him to a stay in New York City, with a surprising twist at the

Breedlove writes poetically, utilizing metaphors in an often surprising and musical way. For instance, when talking of cross-country travels and the limitations of the current definitions of gender, Jim thinks "In all the malls, rest stops, and gas stations

written by and for poor working class queers. Godspeed is able to describe trans issues as they relate to feminism and the patriarch without being the least bit academic-absolutely brilliant! What Breedlove has done is rare, in capturing a living movement of society's "undesirables" in a way that shows you how much the system creates this self-destructive, seemingly unhappy, yet extremely talented, individual. Breedlove describes her style best: "My friends have told me fantastic stories that I just had to put in Godspeed and have Jim do. It's the way I document my people's secret lives. Queers, people of color, working class folk, punks, nobody knows what we do Our lives are invisible. I like to cut little windows and let the rest of the world look in."

Nice window, Lynn!

While an excellent piece of brilliant writing from what I deem both a dyke icon and a role model, *Godspeed* at times needs a bit more editing. After all, there are only so many drug trips one story can support. Nonetheless, Breedlove has created an amazing work of art that must be read and shared, if only to save ourselves. Highly recommended!

This full release from New York based, Crowns on 45,

formally known as The Crowns, is a fiery frenzy of pop punk queercore, pervasive of influence yet unique within the movement. Not On The Menu features Heather Hellskiss on vocals and guitar; Chris Ohnesorge on vocals and drums; Hillary Johnson on keys and console buttons; Ernesto Foronda on guitar; and Jedediah Smith on bass. The title track "Not on the Menu" steals the show for me lyrically: "maybe it was because of the way we looked ... two girls, two ties, some fries, stereotype, we feel it is our duty to inform you of something important, not here on the menu ... " Whereas, "Mouth to Mouth" has a fierce dance beat chuck-full of boy girl vocals wrought with The Haggard influence (yes, the girl screams). "Walk in the Park" speaks to violence against women with an interview with a "Central Park victim," Crowns bellow "No more excuses!" as an anthem to women's empowerment. Not on the Menu is a new favorite on my CD carousel. It's a fine

release that blends influences from The Third Sex, Sleater-Kinney, and The Haggard in a way that makes it a sound all their own, a sound definitive of the queercore music movement.

#### The Quails

We Are the Quails

INCONVENIENT PRESS & RECORDINGS, 2001 Together for over two years, San Francisco based, The Quails (pictured below), bring a unique sound to an exciting movement of new band projects in the Bay Area. Full of boy girl vocals, intermittent claps and drumbeats, The Quails play fun music. The Quails are Seth Lorinczi on bass, guitar, and vocals; Jen Smith on guitar and vocals; and Julianna Bright, on drums and vocals. The Quails have an interesting story around deriving their name. Originally, they started as "The Never Ending Quails" but abbreviated to The Quails for simplicity's sake. Mined from a shop sign in Chinatown where stacks and stacks of caged little game fowl inspired them, less by their captivity than their cartoon nervousness, and the quail, conveniently enough, is the California State Bird. The Quails' eclectic sound and political mindset reminds me of early Gang of Four recordings but with a serious countrified edge. Seth's voice reminds me of David Byrne's, that adds an additional soothing element to their style. In "Taken" the Quails sing a song of torment with beautiful lyrics like "the saddest wound is worse than the unknown". "New Wave," on the other hand, is one of the few tracks on this release with a punk edge fully displaying The Quails amazing ability to include all music genres with this release. Simply put, this is just an amazingly creative first release from some very talented local artists. There is something for everyone on this release mellow, fun and sometimes fast with an all original sound-I recommend it and they will be on the Nectar stage June 30!

# **A Family Affair**

ost people interested in Astrology realize that there are several systems in use around the world. The Hindus of India have their particular system, the Chinese another and even the Tibetans have a particular system all their own. 



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
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
