One of the most unique aspects of CSUMB's concentration on technology has been the formation in 1997 of the Electric Eels. The student group, which specializes in ecommerce, has helped funnel the Dana Lookadoo-Ilari, who was the president of the Electronic Eels, "One of the most important things that CSUMB provided me, through their classes and through my participation in Electronic Eels, was a duel business and technology background. You just can't get that from many schools and it is so important for starting a business."

what Lookadoo-Ilari has done. In fact she has started two businesses. While a student at CSUMB she started Triage Online Solutions, which focused on Web authoring, maintenance, and development. Lookadoo-Ilari developed the company through her CSUMB graduation in 1999 and then went into partnership with Patrick Rayne to form Unique Focus

(www.uniquefocus.com), which was launched in August of last year.

Lookadoo-Ilari says that Unique Focus provides Web hosting, ecommerce, online databases, Web development, and corporate train-

ing. According to their Website the company utilizes business methods to strategically develop each project and follow a prescribed process to ensure that the end product meets each clients objectives.

As CEO of Unique Focus, Lookadoo-Ilari is in charge of sales, marketing, developing business strategies, and helping to guide the over-all direction of the company. "I'm proud of the work we've done so far and I think we're in a good position to be successful," she states.

According to Lookadoollari, her work ethic and her ability to juggle multiple tasks was fostered while she was at CSUMB. Along with being a fulltime student and President of Electric Eels, during her senior year she started teaching CST251, which is CSUMB's basic Web design class. Under the direction of faculty member and Webmaster Greg Pool, Lookadoo-Ilari developed teaching skills that she still uses today by teaching classes for such companies as Sun Microsystems.

"For me the most important part of going to CSUMB was that, through class assignments, I was able to develop a portfolio that got me job offers right out of school," she says.

KAZU, CSUMB Complete Agreement for Community Radio Station

Community radio station KAZU-FM and the Foundation of CSUMB have completed an agreement transferring the assets and broadcast license of the community radio station to the university foundation, representatives of the two organizations announced this passed summer.

The Federal Communications Commission must approve the license transfer from the non-profit Monterey Bay Public Broadcasting Foundation to the Foundation of CSUMB. That process is expected to take at least 60 days.

Documents to start the process have been filed with the FCC in Washington, DC. Until the FCC formally approves the transfer, the CSUMB Foundation cannot participate in the operation or structure of the station, and the current KAZU board remains responsible for all station operations, according to KAZU board President Ken Peterson.

"We're really pleased to be at this point," said Ken Peterson, who heads the board that operates the 23-year-old community radio station. "We believe this is the best way to secure a future for KAZU as an independent community radio voice for the Monterey Bay region, and to preserve the high-quality, diverse programming that has been our hallmark since the beginning."

CSUMB Receives Nearly \$14.5 Million for New Science Center

Governor Gray Davis signed the 2000-2001 appropriations bill, which contained the State of California's first capital outlay expenditure for construction of CSUMB's new Science/Academic Center. The facility, which will be the first new building for the six-year-old campus, will focus on innovative science education. The State appropriation of \$14,450,000 will represent the core of a public-private partnership to construct the 64,000 square foot Center. A community Facilities Committee, chaired by Bob Antle, is working to raise the private and corporate gifts that, along with State Capital Outlay funds, will support the development of the \$22.1 million complex.

State legislators from the Central Coast were instrumental in working to get the state to include the \$14,450,000 in the budget. "We are extremely grateful for the support of Senator McPherson and Assemblyman Keeley for their guidance and support for this project," said CSU Monterey Bay President, Peter Smith. "This was the first time the State of California appropriated capital outlay funds to build a brand new building on this campus, and it could not have happened without the help from our State Senator and State Assemblyman," according to Smith.

Accessing FirstClass

CAN I KEEP MY FIRST CLASS ACCOUNT WHEN I GRADUATE?

Yes, for now. Your Alumni Association has an agreement with the campus to maintain the email accounts of all CSUMB graduates until the new Web Portal under construction is completed. Then

accounts will be moved to the new system.

HOW DO I ACCESS MY FIRST CLASS ALUMNI ACCOUNT?

To access your e-mail account, you will not be using the campus modem pool any longer, but instead you will be accessing the Internet through any Internet



Or, for paid Alumni members only, you may checkout a software CD-ROM from the Alumni Office (building 86A), that will allow you to more quickly load First Class on to your computer.

HOW DO I REACTIVATE MY FIRST CLASS ACCOUNT? If you have not been using your account for a while it may be temporarily on hold. Send an email or call Lin Blaskovich, Director of Alumni Relations, requesting that your account be made active again.

WHAT IS THE NEW ALUMNI WEB PORTAL?

The new web portal under construction will provide alumni with an online community where they will be able to access many useful services and will be able to stay in touch with each other and the University. Imagine your own personal home page that you can customize to suit yourself and which gives you a daily planner, telephone directory and address book; even access to your email by phone, plus customizable links to many new alumni services, such as resume writing, job-bank; a searchable directory of alumni by name, year of graduation, profession or personal interests; up to the



minute news about the University and your friends and fellow alumni; buy alumni logo'd items online; learn of special discounts for home games and special

Service Provider (ISP) you choose, such as AOL, Bell Telephone, or one of the many free ones listed below. Note: Even with free ISP's, it is very important that you choose their local access number for the area you are calling from. Otherwise you could be connecting to a number that is long distance or costing you toll charges!

DO I NEED THE FIRST CLASS SOFTWARE? No, but having the latest First Class software loaded on your desktop or laptop is the best way to access all the features of the email system, including chats and conferences. You may download First Class from http://it.csumb.edu/help/tech/software/shareware/ four letters of our last names followed by the last four numbers of our social security number. The Password: is usually the first five numbers of our social security numbers.

ACCESSING YOUR FIRST CLASS EMAIL FROM A BROWSER: You can also access your email account to a limited extent directly through Netscape or Explorer by going to http://fc.monterey.edu. [Note: do not enter www] Connecting to your account this way instead of through the First Class software won't allow you to use all the features, but you can read and send mail from any computer hooked to the Internet without installing FirstClass. events on campus and in the community; take classes online. And a whole lot more!

WHEN WILL THE NEW ALUMNI WEB PORTAL BE DONE? We expect to see a functional version up in the Spring of next year. You can help by sending in suggestions for features and services you'd like to see included. Also, if you would like to assist as a beta tester as the site is being constructed, or serve on the Web Portal Technology Committee, just let us know! For now, the old web site will be where we will post updates on this project...and other important news. So check in often at http://alumni.monterey.edu
