
Funding Campaign Underway for New Science Center

CSUMB has undertaken a major campaign to raise funds for a new Science/Academic Center, to be located near the center of campus. The \$22.1 million dollar facility will be the first building on campus built using a combination of State and private funds.

To date the University, with the help of the volunteer Facilities Committee

was created last fall to work on raising funds for University priorities and the Science Center is their largest project.

"The new Science/Academic Center is expected to play a vital role for students and faculty at CSUMB and for the scientific community of the central Coast," said Dr. Bill Head, an Earth Systems Science & Policy (ESSP) professor who, along with Dr. Chris Hasegawa, Director of ESSP, and others helped create the campaign. "It will allow the University to move its ESSP program from five disconnected build-

chaired by Bob Antle, CEO of Tanimura and Antle Growers, has raised \$2.35 million from private donors including the David and Lucile Packard Foundation. In addition to these funds CSUMB has requested \$14.5 million from the State. If the money is received the Committee will need to raise \$5.25 million as part of a funding campaign. The Committee is seeking support from private individuals, foundations, and corporate giving programs.

The Facilities Committee is compromised of community and campus leaders and is part of the President's Council. It ings to a single, more contemporary facility."

Also, the Center will help the university accommodate its increasing enrollment. Currently there are 225 students enrolled in the ESSP program. This number is expected to grow to 700 by 2005 and to 1,500 by 2010. Enrollment in mathematics and statistics is also expected to increase dramatically.

CSUMB has received letters of support for the project from Stanford University, University of California,

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Santa Cruz, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. In addition, a study by Stanford Research Institute International, commissioned by the University, stated that the center "can provide significant educational, scientific and economic benefits to the extended Monterey bay region, as well as to California and the nation."

Construction for the Science Center is expected to begin this coming winter and will be completed in December of 2002.



Staff/Faculty Profile: Meet Priscilla Angulo

You could safely say that Priscilla Angulo is familiar with the CSUMB cam-

pus. In her role as both student and employee of the university she spends a lot of time here--especially on Mondays. Angulo starts out her week by attending her Motor Development class from 8-10am, and then works from 10am until 6pm, before heading off to her **Expressive** Arts class from 6-10pm. "This

Angulo, who is a Liberal Studies major and Administrative Support Coordinator for the Liberal Studies Institute (LSI), is taking extra classes so she can graduate this spring.

Though she works with many of her

professors as part of her job, she says that doesn't equal special treatment in the classroom. "Since the professors all know me pretty well, I get asked a lot of questions," she laughs, "but it keeps me focused."

And focus is what's paying off for Angulo. After graduation she plans to enroll in CSUMB's Teaching Credential Program and eventually teach elementary school. She currently volunteers her time teaching preschoolers at her church in her hometown of Hollister and she is excited to use what she has learned from the experience. "I want to give back to my community by teaching kids."

Angulo came to CSUMB after attending San Jose State University's (SJSU) Salinas campus before the satellite campus was closed down in 1995. She says the students that attended SJSU's Salinas campus were given the choice of attending their main campus in San Jose or applying to CSUMB, which was scheduled to open the following semester. "I

went ahead and applied to CSUMB and was accepted," she says. "A short time later one of my friends moved out here and said the campus was hiring. So I filled out an application and within a month I was here." When

Angulo first started at CSUMB

she split her time between working as a school receptionist--answering the university's main phone line--and working for Hank Hendrickson, who was the V.P. for Administration. Now at LSI, she supports Director Betty McEady, three full-time faculty members, and 10 parttime faculty.

Angulo cites CSUMB's multicultural environment as her favorite thing about

working here. "I've really benefited from multiculturalism among not just students, but also my coworkers," she explains. "I love asking people 'what is your custom? What is your culture? What would your parents do?' Just in the short amount of time I've been at CSUMB I've gained so much knowledge about the world."



Cabinet: Function, Structure, and History

In many successful big businesses, the company's president relies on a knowledgeable and focused cabinet to make important decisions and to keep the business running in a forward direction. Though making money and educating people are two completely different things, many universities in the United States have adapted this proven organizational structure in order to produce successful institutions of higher learning. And CSUMB is no different.

According to Hank Hendrickson, President Peter Smith's Chief of Staff, the role of a university cabinet is to focus on the "big picture" and implement policies that crosscut all or several divisions on campus.

CSUMB's Cabinet consists of Smith, Hendrickson, and the University's four Vice Presidents: Interim Provost and V.P. for Academic Affairs, Dr. Diane Cordero de Noriega, V.P. for Administration and Finance, Barbara Lawson, V.P. for Student Affairs, Dr. Bert Rivas, and Executive Director for University Advancement, John McCutchon.

Cabinet meetings at CSUMB are held for two hours every other Monday and begin with short departmental updates from each of the V.P.s. After which, presentations are made by heads of various campus committees followed by questions, answers, and discussions. Hendrickson says there is a lot of give and take between Cabinet members before official university policies are implemented. In the event the Cabinet can't agree, the President makes an interim decision, more information is gathered, and the Cabinet discusses the

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topic again at a later date.

Though Hendrickson feels that the Cabinet's current meetings are productive, he didn't always feel that way. Hendrickson says that up until last year Cabinet meetings were held once a week and lasted for 3 or 4 hours. Also, each member discussed issues in a random fashion. "It was somewhat frustrating to sit in these meetings," he says, "because you never knew what was going to be discussed unless Peter or another Cabinet member had indicted that a specific subject would be on the agenda."

But, Hendrickson, says that has changed. This past fall a system was implemented to better inform each Cabinet member, before each meeting, about the following week's agenda. At the end of every other week each member is given materials that contain background information for the topics that are scheduled for presentation the following week. According to Hendrickson, this helps each member gain a thorough understanding of each issue before the meeting takes place.

"Since we implemented these changes we have been able to utilize our time so much better," says Hendrickson. "Now, everyone comes into each meeting well-informed, asks intelligent questions, and decisions are made in a more timely manner. In general, we're a lot more productive."

Upcoming items on the Cabinet's agenda include updates on the Black Box Cabaret, strategic planning, communications planning, and the upcoming accreditation visit by the Western Association for Schools and Colleges. Though the minutes for the meetings are not made public, Cabinet members will gladly update individuals on the progress of agenda items.

New Life Insurance Plan

California State University is please to offer benefit eligible employees (excluding Unit 4 who will continue to enroll with Cigna) the opportunity to apply for Voluntary Group Life Insurance with The Standard Insurance Company. A special open enrollment is being held from March 1 through April 28, 2000 for employees who wish to enroll in this new plan or change from their CIGNA plan to the Standard plan. This new plan replaces the CIGNA voluntary plan effective January 1, 2000 and will be the only voluntary life insurance open enrollment for the foreseeable future.

Voluntary life insurance is not part of the regular open enrollment process in September/October. If you want to make the change, you need to do it NOW. The effective date of the insurance will be May 1, 2000.

You can apply for up to \$150,000 coverage for yourself without answering medical questions. Also, you may apply for coverage for your spouse and dependent children.

Detailed information including comparison charts between CIGNA and Standard will be distributed to all benefit eligible employees (excluding unit 4) the week of March 20th.

Arrangements have been made with The Standard Insurance Company to meet with campus employees on April 13, at the University Center, room 114, between the hours of 10am and 1pm to provide information and answer employee questions.
