# Proposed Mission Statement Presented to Campus Community

This past Monday at a well-attended reception held at the University Center, CSUMB's 27-member Strategic Planning Team, lead by Provost DIANE CORDERO DE NORIEGA, presented a proposed Mission Statement to the campus community.

The team, which is made up of a diverse cross-section of the campus com-

munity and includes students, faculty, and staff, has met many times over the past several months in order to develop the proposed Mission Statement.

Unlike CSUMB's Vision Statement. which specifically identifies the many underlying "values" of the university and is several

paragraphs long, the university's mission statement is supposed to be a short synopsis of those core values. According to the committee's charge "The Mission Statement should provide a concise description of CSUMB's purpose by answering three critical questions: 1) Who do we serve? 2) What are our aims or purposes? and 3) What are our

defining characteristics?"

In describing the proposed Mission Statement Cordero de Noriega explained to the audience that it has to be "a living, breathing plan; not something that gets written once and put on the shelf."

The Strategic Planning Committee encourages comments and suggestions regarding the proposed Mission Statement. # Staff/Faculty Profile: Meet Cynthia D'Vincent

CYNTHIA D'VINCENT is not the type of person to take a break. Since 1974 she has worked as a biologist, photographer, public speaker, author, sailor, owner and operator of two research vessels-the 93' Varua and the 126' Acania--and founder and President of The Intersea Foundation, which conducts trips throughout Alaska studying marine mammals. To top it off she has also raised two remarkable children. One of which is Storm, a16 year old musician who has already played with the likes Otis Rush and B.B. King, and 14-year-old Eve, who has just authored a nationally distributed article for Scholastic Books.

In 1997 she decided to "settled down" to her home in Carmel and within a short time she was hired as CSUMB's Marine Operations Coordinator, in charge of designing and implementing the university's boating program.

However, D'Vincent's ideas of settling

down aren't the same as most people's ideas. "What I would like to bring to this campus is a wonderful sailing program where every student on campus that wants to learn how to sail and access this beautiful marine sanctuary can," says D'Vincent. "I want to have a really good rental program where people from the community who want to come down and rent our boats can. And to have our rental program be so productive and successful that we're able to get more boats and develop new programs and grow. I'd also like to develop an aquatic center so we have a building right on the water that will house our surfing and kayaking and sailing and diving programs. And I'd like to see

CSUMB be the premiere SCUBA diving school on the West Coast. There's no reason we shouldn't be. We are poised for that."

D'Vincent is currently developing CSUMB's boating and sailing programs. This past semester the university, with the instruction of BOB FURNEY and SCOTT JOHNSON, offered an introductory and advanced sailing class-Sailing I and II- and next semester the department will offer a new class that combines sailing and navigation.

"I want to bring my love of the sea to CSUMB's students and develop programs where they can have access to the ocean and do some interesting things," D'Vincent explains.

D'Vincent's love for the sea took on

epic proportions after she graduated from the University of California, San Diego and then spent a year sailing across the South Pacific. There she discovered that whalers were still killing humpback whales near the Tongan Islands and she became interested in studying small populations of whales and finding out if these populations could withstand the taking of even a few members.

After returning to the States, she took a job with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Marine Mammal Division in Seattle and spent the next ten years conducting various research projects that studied marine mammal populations.

In 1981 she was sent on a project to Alaska to look at the feeding behavior of humpback whales as it relates to vessel traffic around their feeding grounds and she's been going back to visit the same pod of whales ever since. This summer she's taking a "vacation" from CSUMB and is leading three sold-out sailing trips in Alaska to visit her humpback whale pod.

# CSUMB Faculty Apply for Large Grants

# Hackbert Shares Secrets of E-Commerce Success

PETER H. HACKBERT, Professor, Institute for Management and International Entrepreneurship at CSUMB presented a paper on "Lesson Learned: Teaching E-Commerce within an Undergraduate Entrepreneurship Program," a report on the success of the undergraduate program at CSUMB to start "dot.com" companies, at the International Academy of Business Disciplines 12th Annual Meeting, which was held March 30 - April 2, 2000 in Las Vegas, Nevada.

This past fall semester, six student "e-commerce" enterprises were developed and launched within the Institute's E-Commerce class. "Our initial hopes were modest," says Hackbert. "We hoped to help undergraduate students see the career potentials, come to terms with the skill set requirements, and then to craft experiential learning partnerships with start-ups, and emerging information technology enterprises. The results have helped us transform our undergraduate learners."

The CSUMB business program has expanded its reputation and is in the early stages of setting up a research institute, undergraduate course-work concentration, adult learner certification program and in the next two years, a master's degree in electronic commerce or technology management.

### New Shuttle Vehicles in Use

According to SGT. JAY TAGGART from CSUMB's Police Department, beginning Monday, March 27, the Campus Shuttle Service began use of a new shuttle vehicle. The Dodge van is quieter, safer and more economical to

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create a peer and faculty mentoring program on campus, as well as enhance and expand CSUMB's ASAP program.

Also, CARLOS GONZALES,
Director of Migrant Student Support
Services, applied for a grant through
USDE's College Assistance Migrant
Program, which provides supportive academic and social services to help
migrant students successfully complete
their first year of college. For students
who require it, the program continues to
provide financial assistance throughout
their college education. And the program conducts follow-up studies, which
follows each student's progress until
graduation.

According to Lopez, recent grant proposals show an increasing trend by faculty and staff in applying for and receiving money from external sources in order to run CSUMB's unique programs. "We've got amazing faculty and staff on this campus who work very hard and are very dedicated to their programs and who understand they are not going to realize their goals with just state money," says Lopez. "So they know that if they want to enhance programs and educational learning experiences for their students they will need to go after external funding."

So far this fiscal year CSUMB has brought in \$3.8 million in new money from external grants, which adds to the university's total of \$6.5 million in external grants that are currently active. "That's a lot of money for an institution as young as we are," explains Lopez, "and most of that credit goes to our hard-working faculty."

CSUMB's programs that are currently funded through external grants include RIKK KVITEK'S GIS mapping of the California Continental Shelf, funded by the California Department of Fish and Game: DONALDO URIOSTE and YOSHIKO SAITO-ABBOTT'S Monterey Bay Foreign Language Project, funded by CA Assembly Bill 1734; SUSAN ALEXANDER'S Cooperative research in Earth Systems Science, Technology and Applications Project, funded by NASA; JOSE MARTINEZ-SALDAÑA'S Educational Talent Search Program, funded by the USDE: MARK O'SHEA and CATHERINE LOPEZ'S Las Alianzas program, funded by the USDE; and JOHN ITTELSON'S

Preparing Tomorrow's Teachers to use Technology Program, funded by the USDE.

Lopez encourages CSUMB's faculty and staff, who want to apply for grants, to set up a meeting with her office. "If a faculty member wants to start a program but doesn't know what money is out there, they should definitely come meet with us," says Lopez. "We've got a system where they could put in their profile-things that they are interested in-and e-mails will be automatically sent to them as funding alerts come up."
