## Citizenship Ceremonies in Spanish? Election Ballots in Chinese?

Dear Colleague:

For the first 190 years of our nation's history, millions of immigrants came to our shores knowing that they were expected to learn English so that their children could break free from the shackles of the ghetto and claim their share of the American Dream. And it worked. The great American mosaic of countless immigrant cultures, traditions and beliefs bound together by the glue of a common language became the envy of the world.

Unfortunately, the purveyors of political correctness have been successful in creating and protecting big government programs that dissuade new immigrants from learning English. From mandating that election ballots appear in several languages and conducting citizenship ceremonies in languages other than English, the Federal government has expended much effort and resources on programs which have hindered immigrants from assimilating into American society.

Later this week, we will have an opportunity to rectify this situation and empower new Americans.
