Just as the final tables of this report were ready for the press, Hon. Edward P. Colgan, State Controller, and ex officio member of the State Board of Equalization, died in San Francisco on Tuesday, the 20th day of November, 1906. The Governor thereupon appointed Hon. A. B. Nye, of Oakland, to fill the vacancy thus created.

CALIFORNIA HAS LOST A RARE JEWEL OF HONESTY.

In the death of Edward P. Colgan, who for sixteen years has been Controller of this State, California has lost one of the best public servants of the day—one of the best who ever served her.

The lamp which always guided the feet of Edward Colgan was the lamp of scrupulous honesty. In the discharge of his duties he knew no other guide than that of absolute and unflinching integrity. No power on earth could tempt Ed Colgan to do a dishonest or a dishonorable act. His public acts were ever parallel with an undeviating line of conscience.

At every step and stage of his private life and public career, men who knew him thoroughly, men well versed in public affairs, could point to him and truthfully say: "There goes one of the noblest works of God—an honest man." They could also have picked him out and said: "There goes something even more noble, because a little rarer—an undeviatingly honest public official."

Ed Colgan is with the dust, but he has left with his loved ones something far more precious than bonds, or stocks, or jewels—the record of an honest life—a life which was an honor to Ed Colgan and a pride and glory to the State.—*Sacramento Bee*, November 21, '06.

Schedule U shows the ad valorem valuation of property assessed in 1906 to the several "public service corporations." These corporations form the basis upon which the State Tax Commission proposes to tax gross earnings for the support of the State government.

add, in round numbers, \$4,000,000 of taxable property to the several county rolls.

ASSESSMENT OF MORTGAGES.

Schedules C and M show the assessed value of mortgages, together with the assessed value of the property so affected, and the percentage of mortgages borne to the assessed value of real estate and improvements. The average percentage of mortgages in 1906, as shown from the returns, is 14.15. A glance at the schedules shows some very strange figures on the mortgage percentage. For instance, in 1906, Los Angeles County shows a percentage of about $2\frac{1}{2}$, Orange $1\frac{1}{2}$, Riverside $1\frac{2}{3}$, Sacramento $2\frac{1}{2}$, San Bernardino $5\frac{1}{2}$. The extremely low percentage prevailing in many of the counties is accounted for from the fact that the Assessors have adopted an arbitrary rule not to assess a mortgage unless a demand for such assessment is made to the officer by one of the parties to the instrument. In other words, by special agreement between the lender and borrower the mortgage is written "net" as to interest. It would therefore appear that the time is ripe for some consideration being given this mortgage question by those in authority. Along this line is the

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The Legislature, at its recent special session, adopted a proposed constitutional amendment proposing a repeal of Section 5 of Article XIII of the Constitution. The section to be repealed reads as follows:

Every contract hereafter made, by which a debtor is obligated to pay any tax or assessment on money loaned, or on any mortgage, deed of trust, or other lien, shall, as to any interest specified therein, and as to such tax or assessment, be null and void.

This is tantamount to legalizing special agreements between mortgagee and mortgagor on the liability for mortgage taxes.

While this is undoubtedly a step in the right direction, yet this Board urges that the Legislature should submit a constitutional amendment absolutely abolishing the assessment of mortgages. We are aware the plea has been that by exempting the mortgage from taxation the money-lender is not taxed. But this is urged without reflection, for is the lender taxed even when the mortgage is assessed? Experience has shown that the lender, by an increased rate of interest, simply recoups from the needy borrower all and more than the taxes which he pays. Experience further shows that good results are not obtained by the assessment of mortgages. On the contrary, if mortgages were free from taxation, the rate of interest would be less, the cost of assessment less, and the borrower would be less at the mercy of the money-lender. We appeal to the common sense of the people of the State, who are suffering from a self-imposed burden, to demand through the Legislature an amendment to the Constitution exempting mortgages and trust deeds from taxation.

the period noted, 20 per cent fell upon real estate and improvements, while but 4 per cent was awarded to personal property and money.

SOME FIGURES ON ASSESSMENT OF LIVE STOCK.

The Assessors' returns in 1906 show an average assessment as follows:

The stock-owning taxpayers certainly can not complain at these valuations on assessment.

SEPARATION OF STATE AND COUNTY TAXES.

The Board desires to add its indorsement to the scheme for the separation of State and County revenues, as outlined in the preliminary report of the State Tax Commission appointed by your Excellency. It is a matter of great importance to the taxpayers of this State, and deserving of the careful consideration and approval of the legislative branch. It may be here added that the proposed plan of the Tax Commission was applied this year by the State Board, so far as practicable, in the

ASSESSMENT OF RAILROADS.

The Board undertook to fix such an ad valorem assessment on the several railways as would produce a tax of $3\frac{1}{4}$ per cent of the gross earnings on all broad-gauge railroads and $3\frac{1}{4}$ per cent on all narrow-gauge lines. (The rates proposed by the Tax Commission are somewhat higher.) As a result of this method the railway assessments were increased \$11,190,635.

JUDICIAL DECISION CHANGES JURISDICTION.

As a result of the decision of the State Supreme Court in the case entitled *The San Francisco and San Joaquin Valley Railway Company vs. The City of Stockton*, this Board lost jurisdiction for the assessment of much railway property which was awarded to the County Assessors. The decision carried with it the right to assess all sidings, turnouts, spurs, switches, in fact all "improvements" situate either upon or off the right of way of the railroad, and limited the assessment by this Board of the right of way itself to a strip nine rods in width, the overplus thereof falling to the Assessors. REPORT OF STATE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.

To His Excellency, GEORGE C. PARDEE, Governor.

SIR: In accordance with the provisions of law the State Board of Equalization submits the following report covering the assessment years of 1905 and 1906.

Both years have been comparatively prosperous. While the cereal and fruit yields have not been up to the standard as compared with other years, yet California, through development of her many other and varied industries, has kept pace with her sister states.

On the 18th of April, 1906, the coast counties, extending from Humboldt on the north to Monterey on the south, were visited by a terrific earthquake, followed in several instances by fire, whereby several hundred million dollars' worth of property was destroyed. Particularly destructive were the elements in the City and County of San Francisco and in the City of Santa Rosa. By reason of this calamity the assessment roll of the City and County of San Francisco fell off \$148,256,384 in 1906 as compared with the assessment for 1905. Although several other counties suffered great loss, it was not apparent from the 1906 assessment returns. Notwithstanding the great loss from the assessment roll in San Francisco, there was a net loss of assessable property in the State in 1906 of but \$29,000,000 in round numbers, the other counties, together with the action of this Board in the assessment of railways, coming to the rescue with increased assessments. As a result the State was given the low tax rate of forty-seven cents and six mills on each one hundred dollars, or one cent and four mills lower than for the year 1905.

INCREASE IN ASSESSABLE VALUE OF PROPERTY.

In 1896 the total assessed value of property as assessed and returned by the County Assessors was \$1,221,749,699, which, in 1906, had been increased to \$1,514,886,590; an increase of \$293,136,891, or 24 per cent.

A marked difference is shown in the assessments of railroads by this Board. For the year 1896 the total assessment of railroads was \$42,956,704, while in 1906 the assessment was \$80,410,821; an increase of \$37,454,117, or 87 per cent. The increase of mileage in the same period was 28 per cent.

In connection with the increase made by the County Assessors for
