

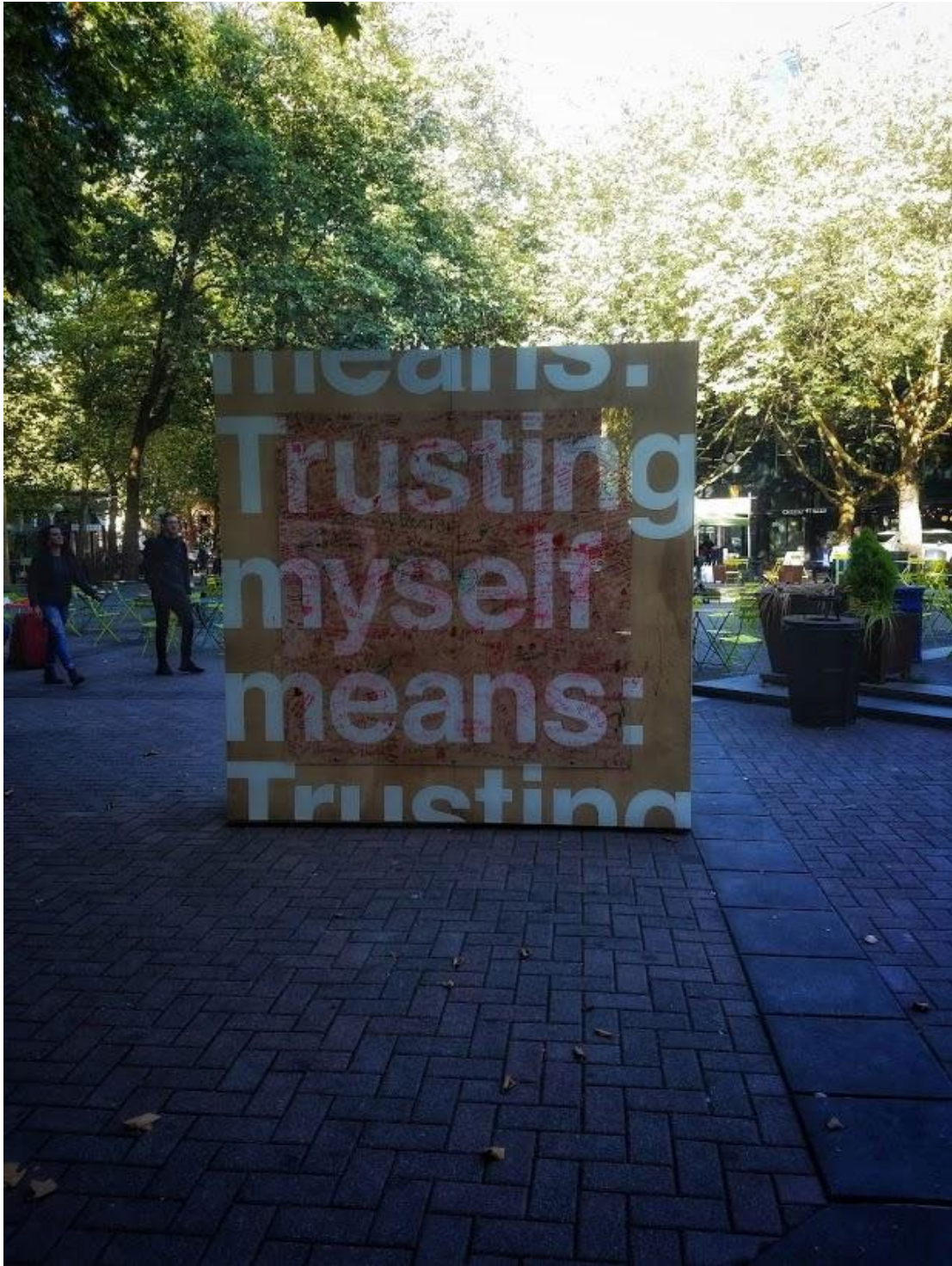

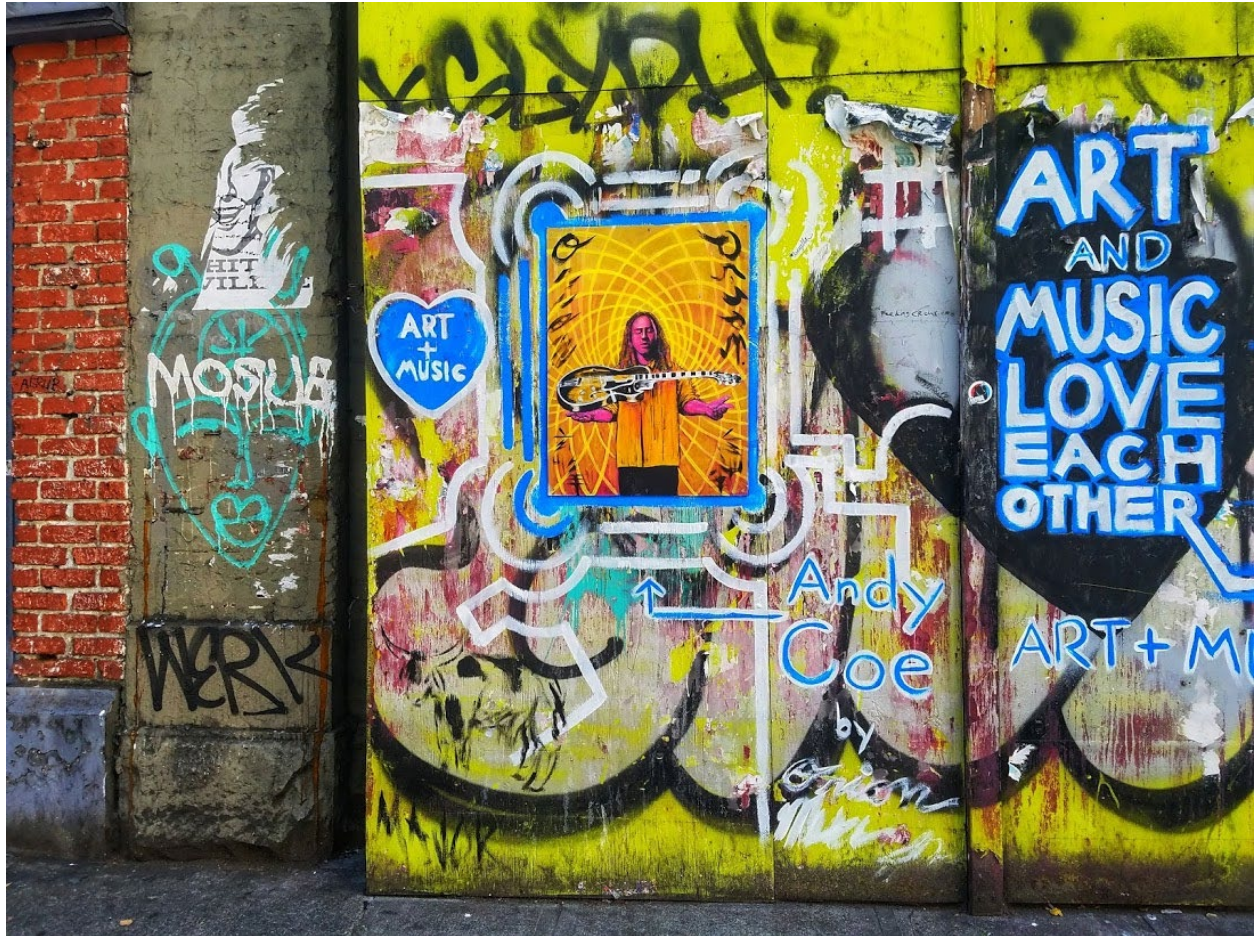


I saw this art on the wall of an alleyway in Seattle. This wall caught my attention with its vibrant colors, but the message is what stuck with me.
