ADDITIONAL DATA (See also back of sheet)

Founded four years after the establishment of presidio. Father Serra selected the site but after his death in 1784 the work was carried on by Father Lasuén, who performed the ceremonies of consecration on December 16, 1786, although the Day of St. Barbara, December 4, has been regarded and reported as the day of founding' (Engelhardt)". Mission Santa Barbara has never suffered from the neglect and decay that fell to the lot of the other missions after secularization. In 1842 the bishops residence was changed from San Diego to Santa Barbara, and, in 1853, a petition to Rome resulted in making the mission a hospice, the beginning of an apostolic college for education of Franciscan novitiates, which is still maintained. This influence saved the mission from neglect. [Rensch]
