Whereas it appears from a duly authenticated transcript filed in the General Land Office of the United States, that pursuant to the provisions of the Act of Congress approved the third day of March Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, entitled "An Act to ascertain and settle the Private Land Claims in the State of California", W. E. P. Hartnell, as claimant, filed his petition on the tenth day of June Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and on the twelfth day of September Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, Teresa de la Guerra, widow, and Guillermo H. Juan, Alvaro, Teresa, José, Matilda, Ana Magdalena, Pablo, Uldario, Amalia, and Silvestre, children, and Pablo de la Guerra, and the aforesaid Maria Teresa de la Guerra de Hartnell, executors of the will of W. E. P. Hartnell, deceased filed a supplemental petition with the Commissioners to ascertain and settle the Private Land Claims in the State of California, sitting as a Board in the City of San Francisco, for the confirmation of the title to a tract of land known by the name of Arisal, situate in the then County of Monterey and State aforesaid; said claim being founded upon a Mexican grant to said W. E. P. Hartnell, made on the twenty-sixth day of June, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, by Jose Figueroa, Superior Political Chief of the Territory of Upper California, which was approved by the Most Excellent Deputation, the sixteenth day of July, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four.
